2023 was a year of exciting new horizons, filled with joy, renewed energy, and dynamic focus on the future as we welcomed all of you back to the Museum for a host of impactful initiatives.

Literally and metaphorically at the heart of our colourful year, our *Rumi* exhibition not only inspired tens of thousands, but also became our secondmost popular exhibition ever — so popular, in fact, that we are currently working on developing a touring version.

Our Museum festivals once again saw our communities come together, with *Rhythms of Canada* attracting 12,000 visitors and Nuit Blanche bringing 5,000 people to the Museum and the Aga Khan Park. Meanwhile, our ninth *Duende Flamenco Festival* in November completely sold out, attracting an audience of nearly 1,400. We succeeded in engaging over 600 students, across Toronto's two largest school boards, through educational outreach programs focused on the intercultural theme of flamenco and some of its spectacular artists.

Throughout the year, our Education team engaged with thousands of students on-site, off-site, and online, with programming during Islamic Heritage

Month in October alone attracting nearly 9,000 participants — a 260 percent increase over 2022!

Looking ahead, our plans are more ambitious than ever. Our goal will be to position the Aga Khan Museum — locally and globally — as the go-to museum and educational resource for intercultural learning around the arts of Muslim cultures, with the aim to foster dialogue, empathy, and understanding between Muslims and non-Muslims and affect positive social change. In terms of our Public Programs, we aspire to become a fully accessible, inclusive, and innovative creative platform and incubator. We will become a broadcasting voice at the heart of the community, empowering thought-provoking, transformative intercultural connections and experiences through exhibitions, public programming, performances, and festivals.

Our global footprint, meanwhile, will grow through our digital **#MuseumWithoutWalls** and our accessible subscription model that will harness digital technology to provide high-quality education and enjoyment online by sharing the best of our Collections, art exhibitions, programs, and performances with individuals and communities globally.

The Museum looks to the future with renewed determination and positivity. There is much to do and contribute to this complex world, and with our vision, mandate, awesome Museum team, and **you**, we will make it happen!

LIVE AT THE AGA KHAN MUSEUM

EXHIBITION AND INSTALLATION HIGHLIGHTS

In 2023, audiences experienced powerful storytelling through original exhibitions, special installations, and themed installations in the Museum and the Aga Khan Park, complemented by digital access available globally through immersive 3D exhibition tours.

The Museum Collections Gallery featured two special themed installations — *Water* and *Inside/Outside* — highlighting objects around these themes designed to help visitors look at the stories contained in the Museum's Collections in new ways.



MAY 13-OCTOBER 1

RUMI

Curator: Dr. Michael Chagnon

Visitors were invited to journey through the life and timeless legacy of Jalal al-Din Muhammad Balkhi (d. 1273), known as Rumi, on the 750th anniversary of his passing. The exhibition explored his early life in Central Asia, his experiences with displacement and migration, and his transformation into one of the most important mystical poets of the Persian-Islamic tradition.

As part of the exhibition, three new major installation works by leading contemporary artists were commissioned: *Distance Between Homes*, by Hangama Amiri; *The Dream That Must Be Interpreted*, by Erdem Taşdelen; and *The Elephant in the Dark*, by Simin Keramati.

Special Projects Curator: Marianne Fenton

Visitors were invited to untangle meaning in a new immersive meditative art installation by Matt Donovan and Hallie Siegel emerging from the centre reflecting pool in the Aga Khan Park.

Inspired by a 13th-century poem attributed to Rumi, *Listen.* picked up where he left off, inviting visitors to open their senses and experience the unknown that lies just beyond their awareness.

SHEZAD DAWOOD: Night in the Garden of Love

Night in the Garden of Love was created by British artist Shezad Dawood, inspired by African-American Muslim musician, composer, and polymath (Allāmah) Dr. Yusef Lateef (1920-2013). In this multilayered exhibition, the garden serves as the starting point for a creative futuristic and intercultural conversation in which art and music can help transform the individual and the environment.

CULTURED PALLETS

Curator: Bita Pourvash

Presented in the Museum Collections Gallery, *Cultured Pallets: Aga Khan Museum*, by Canadian-Iranian artist Soheila Esfahani, is comprised of more than 100 shipping pallets. Esfahani transforms these everyday objects, often used as platforms to transport goods and materials, to capture the feeling of in-betweenness — a space where those experiencing migration often find themselves negotiating identities and cultures.

For this exhibition, which was on display in the Lower-Level Gallery and the Aga Khan Park, Prince Hussain collected photographs taken between 2011 and 2023 in Indonesian waters — some of the most biodiverse underwater places on the planet.


SEPTEMBER 23-OCTOBER 1




PERFORMANCES TO LIFT YOUR SPIRIT

CARMINE: SOMETHING IS AWAKE

Now in its third year, the Intercultural and Creative Music Fellowship is a project aimed at fostering a greater understanding of Muslim heritage in music and film while also helping emerging artists achieve greater professional experience. In the summer of 2023, nine Humber College students worked together to create and record five songs, two films, a zine (self-published booklet), and a series of digital art as part of an album, titled **Something is Awake**.

TD POP-UP PERFORMANCES



LIFELONG LEARNING AT THE AGA KHAN MUSEUM

Innovative and impactful education programs allow young people to explore diverse cultures as well as their own. Students are empowered to learn about themselves and one another, sharing in the common threads that tie them together and celebrating their differences.

The Museum maintains partnerships across Ontario and works with local service organizations to provide complimentary educational programs and community outreach initiatives to marginalized communities. Partners include local school

boards and charities such as the Toronto District School Board, Peel District School Board, and Ronald McDonald House. Through these partnerships, the Museum engages learners with on-site, off-site, and virtual programming. In 2023, 16,700 students attended in-person or virtual educational programs hosted by the Museum.

In October, the Museum partnered with the Toronto District School Board Islamic Heritage Month, providing over 7,000 students with on-site and virtual programs and workshops that highlighted and celebrated the rich contributions of Muslim civilizations to world heritage.

The 2023 Aga Khan Museum Summer Camp welcomed 123 campers from around the world — from the United States to Australia and South Africa as well as many newcomers to Canada.



This Being Human

2023 marked the third season of the Museum's beloved podcast hosted by Abdul-Rehman Malik, reaching 135,000 people across 136 countries since the podcast's inception.

Season 3 highlights included award-winning journalist and producer Noor Tagouri, world-renowned musician Zakir Hussain, and a special live-audience recording of the podcast with

Abdul-Rehman's sister, Ausma Malik, the first woman in a hijab to be elected to public office in Canada, and the first Muslim-identifying, hijab-wearing woman on Toronto City Council.

IAM

(digital-only exhibition)

In 2021, during the pandemic shutdown, the Museum collaborated with Torontobased visual artist and scientist Radha Chaddah to present her work, *IAM*, on the #MuseumWithoutWalls platform. Act 2 was released on #MuseumWithoutWalls in 2022 as the Museum's first entirely digital exhibition. Acts 3 and 4 debuted as a mesmerizing multidisciplinary performance in 2023.

TARANA DIGITAL PROJECT

Co-produced with Pratibha Arts, the Tarana Digital Project is a series of videos showcasing works by Bageshree Vaze that celebrate the spectrum of Kathak music and dance — from the rhythmic language to the facial expressions and lyrical movements. It is focused on engaging audiences with South Asian dance while equipping viewers with educational tools to further the awareness and appreciation of the Kathak tradition — one of the original forms of Indian classical dance influenced by the Mughal period.


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






OPERATIONS
